What is the Transatlantic Educators Dialogue?

The Transatlantic Education Dialogue (T.E.D.) is an opportunity for educators in the United States of America and the European Union to come together online for shared exploration and examination of a variety of educational topics related to issues of identity and difference, with a particular emphasis on representations of “the other” in the classroom.

This experience of educational diplomacy and exploration from multiple perspectives will enable educators to overcome cultural misunderstandings and misconceptions.

Who is involved with T.E.D.?

A total of 50 educators in the US and the E.U. will be involved. Participants may be current teachers, pre-service teacher education students, school administrators, graduate students, and education faculty.

Where Does T.E.D. Meet?

Participants can participate anywhere, provided they have access to the internet. Weekly sessions are synchronous; readings and reflections take place asynchronously.

Synchronous sessions take place weekly for ninety minutes using Blackboard Collaborate. This online application enables registered participants to simultaneously communicate with classmates by using microphones connected to their computers, typing into a shared chat-rooms, contributing notes on a “chalkboard” tool, and using webcams and other capabilities to upload videos and picture images.

Prior to each weekly session, participants will have assigned readings representing US and EU perspectives on the topic. Readings will be available through a shared course website called Moodle. Using Moodle, participants can share articles with other participants, post comments on topic specific forums, and send messages to other participants.

Why Participate in T.E.D.?

- learn about transatlantic educational systems and realities
- networking opportunities with transatlantic counterparts
- opportunities for career development, professional reflection, and growth, acknowledged in an official capacity at the end of the program
- develop critical thinking and analytical skills, with a focus on making connections between current events and material covered in our discussions
- share experiences with other educators, maintain connections with other participants, and have your students engage in online classroom exchanges
- Upon successful completion of T.E.D., all participants will receive a Certification of Completion.

U.S. Participants: Up to 30 non-credit Professional Development Hours (PDH) for Illinois teachers and up to 3.0 non-credit Continuing Education Units (CEU) for 30 contact hours for non-Illinois teachers are available.

How Much Does it Cost?

There is no fee to participate in T.E.D.
